Ben Sauvé Artstrek Bursary

This bursary allows young people, who require financial support, to experience the joy of learning while in the Theatre Alberta Artstrek program. Ben was a Grade 12 student who attended the Artstrek program and was passionate about the arts. This bursary was created by Ben's loved ones in his memory, after he was tragically killed in a traffic accident in 1987.

For as long as Ronan can remember, he has been passionate about acting. During this first year at the school, Ronan actively participated in a variety of art classes and in many performances including Leaps & Bounds, Alumnifest and PlayWorks. As a leader on the City of Edmonton Youth Council, she wrote a memorandum to Edmonton's city council advocating for the implementation of a mask bylaw in the city, and particularly in schools; and she served as the chair of the Internal Affairs Subcommittee, leading a team of 25 whose work resulted in the creation of several reports and policies to improve the council's structure. Talia, who is also the recipient of three other Division scholarships, is highly involved in both school and community activities and advocacy initiatives. As a member of the Victoria School Indigenous Leadership Team, she helped to plan the Indigenous celebration month and Indigenous graduation ceremony. Talia took an active role in organizing and planning the 2022 Walk for Wenjack, a fundraising initiative on behalf of the Gord Downie & Chanie Wenjack Fund to commemorate the memory of a young boy who died trying to escape a residential school and other survivors of Canada's residential school system. In her leadership role, Talia collaborated with her peers to create a slideshow to educate her classmates about Chanie and the residential school system. Talia demonstrates exemplary interpersonal skills that show responsibility, respect, and caring in order to establish and maintain healthy interactions. She understands that she, as an Indigenous role model, will continue to contribute to the Indigenous and greater Edmonton community as she seeks higher education. This fall, Talia will pursue a bachelor of arts degree in anthropology at the University of Alberta.

Esther and Peter Cunliffe Scholarship

This scholarship recognizes a Grade 12 student who demonstrates excellent academic performance, outstanding personal and leadership qualities and who requires financial support to attend one of the following post-secondary institutions: University of Alberta, Northern Alberta Institute of Technology or MacEwan University. In the spring of 2000, Esther and Peter Cunliffe made a commitment for a portion of their estate to be made available for scholarships for students graduating from Edmonton Public Schools.

Talia, who is also the recipient of three other Division scholarships, is a conscientious honours student who dedicates time, effort and heart to difficult and challenging activities aimed at advancing the work of anti-racism and reconciliation. As part of an anti-racism student initiative, she helped write a letter to the Minister of Education about the debate on whether or not anti-racism should be taught in schools. As a result of the impact of Talia's volunteerism in her community, she was one of the few youth invited to participate in Pope Francis' 2022 visit that was part of the Vatican's actions towards reconciliation. Talia shared in the commemorative experience by selecting gifts of Indigenous art to personally present to the Pope. She believes a postsecondary education will provide the skills necessary to fulfill her goals in walking the path towards reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island. This fall, Talia will pursue a bachelor of arts degree in anthropology at the University of Alberta.

French Bilingual Awards

She was also a member of the Victoria Anti-Racism Student Initiative where she helped research and promote cultural celebrations and served as a representative during the school's annual open house. Talia joined the graduation committee where she organized, planned and orchestrated fundraising events along with her peers and reached out to local businesses to seek sponsorship. Since the onset of the pandemic, Talia has been volunteering in the inner city to prepare sandwiches (using personal funds), make or distribute food hampers and organize clothes for donations to support homeless and low-income families.
